



- -51% of farmland lost in Buncombe County between 1950 and 1978
- -Began seeking solutions to the problem in 1980 by meeting with American Farmland Trust and others
- Mid to late 1980's Worked with County Commissioners/Planning Department laying groundwork for an ordinance
- Adopted VAD Ordinance in late 1989 the second one adopted in the state
- Currently 347 farms enrolled in VAD and just over 26,400 acres.
- Conservation Easements
 - 1997 Board began looking at making changes to the VAD specifically adding Purchase of Development Rights
 - Seen as an alternative to multiple use zoning in the County (purchase of development rights)
 - To Fund Easements: 2001 \$109,000 available from sale of County land
 - Used as "seed" money and paid transaction costs on two farms.
 - County currently holds four three permanent easements and one more to close by early 2010

Other County Actions:

- Developed a comprehensive Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Plan for the County
- Established a new position at the SWCD to work with conservation easements.
- Commissioners have made sustaining the farming livelihood one of its top priorities in their 2009-2012 Strategic Plan
